

READING(S)

First Reading: Proverbs 25:6-7a

Second Reading: *Hebrews 13: 1-8, 15-16*

Let mutual affection continue. Do not neglect to show hospitality to strangers, for by doing that some have entertained angels without knowing it. Remember those who are in prison, as though you were in prison with them, those who are being tortured, as though you yourselves were being tortured. Let marriage be held in honor by all, and let the marriage bed be kept undefiled, for God will judge the sexually immoral and adulterers. Keep your lives free from the love of money, and be content with what you have, for he himself has said, "I will never leave you or forsake you." So we can say with confidence,

"The Lord is my helper;

I will not be afraid.

What can anyone do to me?"

Remember your leaders, those who spoke the word of God to you; consider the outcome of their way of life, and imitate their faith. Jesus Christ is the same yesterday and today and forever. Through him, then, let us continually offer a sacrifice of praise to God, that is, the fruit of lips that confess his name. Do not neglect to do good and to share what you have, for such sacrifices are pleasing to God.

Gospel Reading: Luke 14:1, 7-14

The Holy Gospel according the Luke, the 14th Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord!**On one occasion when Jesus was going to the house of a leader of the Pharisees

to eat a meal on the Sabbath, they were watching him closely.

Readings Continued

When he noticed how the guests chose the places of honor, he told them a parable. "When you are invited by someone to a wedding banquet, do not sit down at the place of honor, in case someone more distinguished than you has been invited by your host, and the host who invited both of you may come and say to you, 'Give this person your place,' and then in disgrace you would start to take the lowest place. But when you are invited, go and sit down at the lowest place, so that when your host comes, he may say to you, 'Friend, move up higher'; then you will be honored in the presence of all who sit at the table with you. For all who exalt themselves will be humbled, and those who humble themselves will be exalted."

He said also to the one who had invited him, "When you give a luncheon or a dinner, do not invite your friends or your brothers and sisters or your relatives or rich neighbors, in case they may invite you in return, and you would be repaid. But when you give a banquet, invite the poor, the crippled, the lame, and the blind. And you will be blessed because they cannot repay you, for you will be repaid at the resurrection of the righteous."

WEEKLY DEVOTIONS

Monday - Prayer of the Day

O God, you resist those who are proud and give grace to those who are humble. Give us the humility of your Son, that we may embody the generosity of Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

Tuesday - Connections with the Liturgy

Several of the prayers before and after Holy Communion (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, pp. 107, 114, 64, 65) make explicit the Christian conviction that "offerings," that is "sacrifices," are now given not to the deities, but to all in need, "those who hunger in any way."

Wednesday - Especially for Children

Talk about who gets invited to birthday parties, and who does not. Does your family have rules about how many guests can be invited? Yet on Sunday morning, anyone who comes is welcome to sit with us, to sing our songs, to exchange the peace, to be washed with baptism, and to come to the table.

Thursday - Connections with Creation

In climate-justice discussions, we must ask ourselves, "Who is not at the table?" For those in the Global North, we miss the most devastating impacts of climate change and the most ingenious solutions when we don't listen to those most impacted—people who are poor or oppressed and those in the Global South. When Jesus teaches us that "all who humble themselves will be exalted" (Luke 14:11), he does not mean this in a worldly sense, wherein exaltation means possessing the power to exploit others. Instead, the humble are exalted in what liberation theologians call God's "preferential option for the poor," who have unique insights about God and God's justice. Christ urges us to include all at the table, especially the people most harmed.

Friday - Reflection on the Gospel Reading

Christ's call is to countercultural behavior: the society is hierarchical, but the church is to enact a surprising acceptance of the poor, to give to others with no expectation of return. Jesus is the model, who gave himself all the way to death, and who was indeed repaid in his resurrection.

Saturday - Hymn of the Day

The contemporary hymn writer Marty Haugen has provided a fine hymn for this Sunday. "Gather Us In" (ELW 532) presents opposites—"the lost and forsaken, the rich and the haughty"—which will be sure to include all of us and all those who might come into our assemblies. The banquets that Luke describes are taking place now.
