**Gospel Reading:** *Luke 13:10-17* 

The Holy Gospel according the Luke, the 12<sup>th</sup> Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord!**Now [Jesus] was teaching in one of the synagogues on the Sabbath. And just then there appeared a woman with a spirit that had crippled her for eighteen years. She was bent over and was quite unable to stand up straight. When Jesus

saw her, he called her over and said, "Woman, you are set free from your ailment." When he laid his hands on her, immediately she stood up straight and began praising God. But the leader of the synagogue, indignant because Jesus had cured on the Sabbath, kept saying to the crowd, "There are six days on which work ought to be done; come on those days and be cured and not on the Sabbath day." But the Lord answered him and said, "You hypocrites! Does not each of you on the Sabbath until his ox or his donkey from the manger and lead it to water? And ought not this woman, a daughter of Abraham whom Satan bound for eighteen long years, be set free from this bondage on the Sabbath day?" When he said this, all his opponents were put to shame, and the entire crowd was rejoicing at all the wonderful things being done by him.

# **WEEKLY DEVOTIONS**

# **Monday - Prayer of the Day**

O God, mighty and immortal, you know that as fragile creatures surrounded by great dangers, we cannot by ourselves stand upright. Give us strength of mind and body, so that even when we suffer because of human sin, we may rise victorious through your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord. Amen.

# **Tuesday - Connections with the Liturgy**

Jesus speaks of the sabbath as a day to set captives free. In the Confession and Forgiveness at the outset of Sunday worship (ELW, p. 95), we admit that since we remain captive to sin, we need Christ to free us from this bondage.

# Wednesday - Let the Children Come

The societal pressure to engage in all the kids' activities often dictates a household's busyness, especially once you have school-aged kids. They start their days early and end them late, moving from one activity to the other. Think about what sabbath looks like for you and your family. Ask the kids in your life some of the following questions: "What's something you do that is calm and relaxing for you? What's your favorite way to spend time with your family? What are some ways you can spend time with God each week? What's a fun or thoughtful way for you to

show kindness this week?" Add thirty to sixty seconds of silence or calming breath work into your routine a few times a day. Kids can oversee starting and ending your moment of silence. Or kids can lead and model taking deep breaths before transitions, prayer, or other tasks throughout the day.

# **Thursday - Connections with Creation**

The sabbath—the theme of both Luke and Isaiah today—is a promise of rest intended for humanity and all creation. The Torah demands that all humans, as well as livestock and fields, receive rest. This rest is intended as a sign of God's love for the whole earth. Isaiah acknowledges this implicitly, wherein living justly (including observing the sabbath) restores both drought-stricken places and human neighborhoods. Jesus, teaching according to traditional Jewish interpretation, admonishes the religious leaders that the sabbath is not a punishment, where human and nonhuman animals are meant to suffer, but a day of freedom for all who suffer. In preaching about the sabbath, it is important that we—living in a climate crisis—remember rest for the earth too.

# Friday - Reflection on the Gospel Reading

Perhaps, like countless old women throughout time, this woman had osteoporosis. But we all know about the condition of being bowed down by age, infirmity, or distress. In Christ we can stand upright. The sabbath controversy presents us with not only the question of how is God truly honored, but also the picture of Christ who replaces the sabbath, the one who sets us free.

# Saturday - Hymn of the Day

A fine eighteenth-century hymn, originally signed by only the letter "K," is "How firm a foundation" (ELW 796). As if we are the bent woman, we give thanks that God has caused us to stand, and we pray for continued strength into our old age.
