First Reading: Habakkuk 1:1-4; 2:1-4 Second Reading: 2 Timothy 1:1-14

Paul, an apostle of Christ Jesus by the will of God, for the sake of the promise of life that is in Christ Jesus,

To Timothy, my beloved child:

Grace, mercy, and peace from God the Father and Christ Jesus our Lord.

I am grateful to God—whom I worship with a clear conscience, as my ancestors did—when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day. Recalling your tears, I long to see you so that I may be filled with joy. I am reminded of your sincere faith, a faith that lived first in your grandmother Lois and your mother Eunice and now, I am sure, lives in you. For this reason I remind you to rekindle the gift of God that is within you through the laying on of my hands, for God did not give us a spirit of cowardice but rather a spirit of power and of love and of self-discipline.

Do not be ashamed, then, of the testimony about our Lord or of me his prisoner, but join with me in suffering for the gospel, in the power of God, who saved us and called us with a holy calling, not according to our works but according to his own purpose and grace, and this grace was given to us in Christ Jesus before the ages began, but it has now been revealed through the appearing of our Savior Jesus Christ, who abolished death and brought life and immortality to light through the gospel. For this gospel I was appointed a herald and an apostle and a teacher, and for this reason I suffer as I do. But I am not ashamed, for I know the one in whom I have put my trust, and I am sure that he is able to guard until that day the deposit I have entrusted to him. Hold to the standard of sound teaching that you have heard from me, in the faith and love that are in Christ Jesus. Guard the good deposit entrusted to you, with the help of the Holy Spirit living in us.

Gospel Reading: Luke 17:5-10

The Holy Gospel according to Luke, the 17th Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord!**

The apostles said to the Lord, "Increase our faith!" The Lord replied, "If you had faith the size of a mustard seed, you could say to this mulberry tree, 'Be uprooted and planted in the sea,' and it would obey you.

"Who among you would say to your slave who has just come in from plowing or tending sheep in the field, 'Come here at once and take your place at the table'? Would you not rather say to him, 'Prepare supper for me; put on your apron and serve me

while I eat and drink; later you may eat and drink? Do you thank the slave for doing what was commanded? So you also, when you have done all that you were ordered to do, say, 'We are worthless slaves; we have done only what we ought to have done!' "

WEEKLY DEVOTIONS

Monday - Prayer of the Day

Benevolent, merciful God: When we are empty, fill us. When we are weak in faith, strengthen us. When we are cold in love, warm us, that with fervor we may love our neighbors and serve them for the sake of your Son, Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

Tuesday - Connections with the Liturgy

The Timothy reading speaks of the "laying on of hands." Christians continue the ancient practice of the laying on of hands, first described in the Bible when the dying Isaac blesses his sons (Gen. 48:14). Evangelical Lutheran Worship suggests the laying on of hands in baptism (p. 213), the affirmation of baptism (p. 236), confession and forgiveness (pp. 241, 244), and marriage (p. 289), as well as in several of the occasional services, such as ordination. The gesture evolved from the natural human sign of affection and usually symbolizes a prayer for God to bless the recipient, such as when parents bless their children each morning when they leave for school. Historically especially in ordination, it came also to denote a transfer of power.

Wednesday - Especially for Children

Having faith is a mysterious thing. It is not easy to understand or even describe. Through the decades, the church has tried to label the part of ministry we see to "increase our faith" with a revolving door of names—didache, catechesis, Sunday school, faith formation, growth in faith—as if by finding the right name or curriculum, we could control or harness the wild, mysterious thing of faith. With the bravado of an eight-year-old child with a cape and treehouse, Jesus dares his disciples to find that seed-sized thimble full of trust within, in order to face the seemingly impossible task of renewal, rebirth, and rerooting. How do you contain faith or trust in your space? A butterfly net? A chalice? Music or banner?

Thursday - Connections with Creation

Gardeners are accustomed to dealing with weeds. At this point in the gardening season, some may have given up and succumbed to letting weeds overcome their preferred plantings in spite of their wishes. Such horticultural favoritism of ours makes it all the more striking that Jesus' image of faith is a mustard seed—a small seed that grows into a weed, drawing a gardener's displeasure but harboring life. Some invasive plants and weeds that seem to be taking over your area are indeed quite harmful to the broader environment. But you might also ponder where your own intended plantings disrupt the natural, and even the divine, spread and flow of life.

Friday - Reflection on the Gospel Reading

Today's extreme description of Christian life—lived by "worthless slaves" whose faith cannot possibly be adequate enough—is surprising in Luke. Yet here is also Luke's promise of mercy: Christ, our lord, amazes us by serving us at table.

Saturday - Hymn of the Day

"O Spirit of life" (ELW 405), written by Johann Niedling and first printed in 1651, responds to the final line in the second reading that speaks of the help of the Holy Spirit. The second stanza cites the gospel line, "increase our faith." The imagery of light in the last stanza recalls the second reading, which speaks of the light of the gospel. Only by the indwelling of the Holy Spirit can we live as 2 Timothy urges us to.
