READING(S)

First Reading: Job 19:23-27a

Second Reading: 2 Thessalonians 2:1-5, 13-17

As to the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ and our being gathered together to him, we beg you, brothers and sisters, not to be quickly shaken in mind or alarmed, either by spirit or by word or by letter, as though from us, to the effect that the day of the Lord is already here. Let no one deceive you in any way, for that day will not come unless the rebellion comes first and the lawless one is revealed, the one destined for destruction. He opposes and exalts himself above every so-called god or object of worship, so that he takes his seat in the temple of God, declaring himself to be God. Do you not remember that I told you these things when I was still with you?

But we must always give thanks to God for you, brothers and sisters beloved by the Lord, because God chose you as the first fruits for salvation through sanctification by the Spirit and through belief in the truth. For this purpose he called you through our gospel, so that you may obtain the glory of our Lord Jesus Christ. So then, brothers and sisters, stand firm and hold fast to the traditions that you were taught by us, either by word of mouth or by our letter.

Now may our Lord Jesus Christ himself and God our Father, who loved us and through grace gave us eternal comfort and good hope, comfort your hearts and strengthen them in every good work and word.

The Word of the Lord. Thanks be to God!

Gospel Reading: Luke 20:27-38

The Holy Gospel according to Luke, the 20th Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord!**

Some Sadducees, those who say there is no resurrection, came to [Jesus] and asked him a question: "Teacher, Moses wrote for us that if a man's brother dies leaving a wife but no children, the man shall marry the widow and raise up children for his brother. Now there were seven brothers; the first married a woman and died childless; then the second and the third married her, and so in the same way all seven died childless. Finally the woman also died. In the resurrection, therefore, whose wife will the woman be? For the seven had married her."

Jesus said to them, "Those who belong to this age marry and are given in marriage, but those who are considered worthy of a place in that age and in the resurrection from the dead neither marry nor are given in marriage. Indeed, they

cannot die anymore, because they are like angels and are children of God, being children of the resurrection. And the fact that the dead are raised Moses himself showed, in the story about the bush, where he speaks of the Lord as the God of Abraham, the God of Isaac, and the God of Jacob. Now he is God not of the dead but of the living, for to him all of them are alive."

WEEKLY DEVOTIONS

Monday - Prayer of the Day

O God, our eternal redeemer, by the presence of your Spirit you renew and direct our hearts. Keep always in our mind the end of all things and the day of judgment. Inspire us for a holy life here, and bring us to the joy of the resurrection, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

Tuesday - Connections with the Liturgy

Every Sunday we are called by God to receive the proclamation of the good news (2 Thess. 2:14). The concluding verses of the second reading are parallel to the options for each Sunday's final blessing (Evangelical Lutheran Worship, pp. 114-115).

Wednesday - Let the Children Come

All people think about death and what happens after we die—even children. The Sadducees are trying to trap Jesus in a spiral of what-ifs, and they suppose God's kin(g)dom must be governed in the same earthly way of power, privilege, and hierarchy that we are familiar with. Jesus takes the concept of the least powerful—children—and equates them with messengers of God, inviting all into a child-like new life. As always, Jesus turns everything upside down and inside out, as the laws of oppression don't translate to a heavenly eternity and the days are numbered for power and hierarchy. The playground bully of death has no control in God's kin(g)dom. How can children invite us into the life-giving hope promised in Jesus?

Thursday - Life on the Earth

Amid readings that touch on the afterlife, the second reading addresses our life here, that we be strengthened "in every good work." Relatively new in Christian thought is the thought that many good works ought to be directed to the earth itself. How is our God "of the living" a God also of the animals?

Friday - Reflection on the Gospel Reading

The Sadducees meant to ridicule speculation about an afterlife. However, even this passage has served to feed Christian imagination about an angelic existence in the afterlife. The New Testament describes Jesus Christ as the first to experience resurrection, and believers continue to hope that the God of the living will be their God even after death. The New Testament proclaims the resurrection of the body, not the immortal soul that is currently believed by many Christians and affirmed by many clergy. Attention to the end of all things is fitting at the close of each liturgical year.

Saturday - Hymn of the Day

This is the week to sing "I know that my Redeemer lives!" (ELW 619). Written by Samuel Medley, this hymn was first printed in 1775. Converted by a sermon written by hymn writer Isaac Watts, Medley later heard the preaching of the evangelist George Whitefield and became a Baptist minister in Liverpool, England. The stanzas call Jesus Redeemer, friend, prophet, priest, king, and Savior, and in characteristic biblical style, rely on verbs to laud the risen Christ.
