First Reading: Psalm 98

Second Reading: 2 Thessalonians 3:6-13

Now we command you, brothers and sisters, in the name of our Lord Jesus Christ, to keep away from every brother or sister living irresponsibly and not according to the tradition that they received from us. For you yourselves know how you ought to imitate us; we were not irresponsible when we were with you, and we did not eat anyone's bread without paying for it, but with toil and labor we worked night and day so that we might not burden any of you. This was not because we do not have that right but in order to give you an example to imitate. For even when we were with you, we gave you this command: anyone unwilling to work should not eat. For we hear that some of you are living irresponsibly, mere busybodies, not doing any work. Now such persons we command and exhort in the Lord Jesus Christ to do their work quietly and to earn their own living. Brothers and sisters, do not be weary in doing what is right.

Gospel Reading: Luke 21:5-19

The Holy Gospel according to Luke, the 21st Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord!**

When some were speaking about the temple, how it was adorned with beautiful stones and gifts dedicated to God, [Jesus] said, "As for these things that you see, the days will come when not one stone will be left upon another; all will be thrown down."

They asked him, "Teacher, when will this be, and what will be the sign that this is about to take place?" And he said, "Beware that you are not led astray, for many will come in my name and say, 'I am he!' and, 'The time is near!' Do not go after them.

"When you hear of wars and insurrections, do not be terrified, for these things must take place first, but the end will not follow immediately." Then he said to them, "Nation will rise against nation and kingdom against kingdom; there will be great earthquakes and in various places famines and plagues, and there will be dreadful portents and great signs from heaven.

"But before all this occurs, they will arrest you and persecute you; they will hand you over to synagogues and prisons, and you will be brought before kings and governors because of my name. This will give you an opportunity to testify. So

make up your minds not to prepare your defense in advance, for I will give you words and a wisdom that none of your opponents will be able to withstand or contradict. You will be betrayed even by parents and siblings, by relatives and friends, and they will put some of you to death. You will be hated by all because of my name. But not a hair of your head will perish. By your endurance you will gain your souls."

The Gospel of our Lord. **Praise to you, O Christ!**

WEEKLY DEVOTIONS

Monday - Prayer of the Day

O God, the protector of all who trust in you, without you nothing is strong, nothing is holy. Embrace us with your mercy, that with you as our ruler and guide, we may live through what is temporary without losing what is eternal, through Jesus Christ, our Savior and Lord.

Tuesday - Connections with the Liturgy

Both the Nicene Creed and the Apostles' Creed speak of the coming of Christ to judge the living and the dead. It is this judgment of which Luke speaks and in anticipation of which the rivers of Psalm 98 are clapping their hands.

Wednesday - Let the Children Come

Also children fear abandonment and violence and danger. Depending on the age of the children who are addressed, it might be anything from news of gun violence in schools to the natural disaster of a hurricane to a recent cartoon film that threatens the imagination of children. Even Hansel and Gretel face a witch who wants to eat them. The church is called to honesty about human life, even when talking with children, and earnest assurances that these children will always be safe are false. Together the Christian community prays for God's protection, no matter what comes.

Thursday - Life on the Earth

Many hymns that thank God for nature are marked by nineteenth-century Romanticism that describes an earth of beautiful sunsets and singing birds. Yet the truth of nature is also like the apocalyptic visions of earthquakes and famines. Indeed, Charles Darwin's discoveries were most unsettling to him because he could not imagine how an earth so reliant on nature's violence could have come from a beneficent Creator. In view of the natural disasters mentioned in today's gospel, we meditate on the mystery of God and beg for divine protection.

Friday - Reflection on the Gospel Reading

The human fear of future terrors is perennial. Not breath-taking buildings, nor stunning art, nor religious affiliation, nor national pride, nor the stability of the earth, nor what our society likes to call "family values" will save: Christ is the one.

Saturday - Hymn of the Day

A hymn appropriate for the day is "Through the night of doubt and sorrow" (ELW 327). The hymn was written in 1825 by Bernhardt Ingemann, a Danish university professor of literature and author of historical novels. The church is described as a pilgrim band marching through life's difficulties, which are vividly cited in the stanzas. Those Christians who currently are not facing "doubt, sorrow, darkness, gloom, terror, conflict, peril, and the shame of the cross" can sing this hymn for the many Christians around the world who are suffering in these ways, for we understand ourselves to be a pilgrim band helping one another travel through life's troubles.
