

READING

Reading: *Luke 17:5-10*

The Holy Gospel according to Luke, the 17th Chapter. **Glory to you, O Lord.**

On the way to Jerusalem Jesus was going through the region between Samaria and Galilee. As he entered a village, ten men with a skin disease approached him. Keeping their distance, they called out, saying, "Jesus, Master, have mercy on us!" When he saw them, he said to them, "Go and show yourselves to the priests." And as they went, they were made clean. Then one of them, when he saw that he was healed, turned back, praising God with a loud voice. He prostrated himself at Jesus's feet and thanked him. And he was a Samaritan. Then Jesus asked, "Were not ten made clean? So where are the other nine? Did none of them return to give glory to God except this foreigner?" Then he said to him, "Get up and go on your way; your faith has made you well."

BRINGING IT HOME

This section provides guidance on how to discuss a passage from the Revised Common Lectionary for the week as a family! The devotions for this week are for Psalm 66:1-12

Reflection Questions

- We are in the Season after Pentecost, where we grow in our faith, deepen our roots in community, and stretch toward justice. In this psalm, we heard how people experience God in different ways. What did the people remember God has done?
- Memory isn't just about remembering things; it helps our church know we're part of God's big story. How do these memories of what God has done help us know who we are and how God is with us?
- Praise to God happens with other people and by ourselves. What stories of praise do we hear every year, like Jesus' birth at Christmas?
- What does praise look like in our psalm?
- Some stories are told to include and free people, and some are told to leave people out or take power. When we tell our stories of God, how do we make sure they help everyone belong?

Activity

In today's psalm, we learned about different ways of praising God. We can praise God by making a joyful noise, singing a glorious song, telling stories of what God has done, whispering thanks to God for never leaving us, and remembering God wants justice and goodness for us. When we read this psalm, it might bring up memories of when God helped us feel unexpected strength, courage, or love. These memories help us remember we're part of a larger story that is freeing and liberating; our personal and collective memories help us be honest about hard things and grateful for how God has helped us.

Together with the children in your life, create a story of praise! Remember, praise is honest, so the praise can tell a story that might be about a difficult situation. Praise is also a reminder God doesn't side with the powerful but with all people, especially those going through hard things. To create a story, invite the children to consider how they are truthtellers and keepers of hope as they talk together in a group about their different experiences.

Start with the phrase, "Come and see what God has done...," and have them recall a situation when God was there for them. It is possible and good to share stories of praise even if the situation remains unresolved. Children can share their story through various means: drawing, collaging, writing, creating a song with instruments, or writing their own psalm. Invite participants to share their story as a way to remind everyone that when we tell honest stories of where God showed up—whether through strength, love, or justice—we help each other remember we're never alone, and we keep the story of God's goodness going

Prayer

God of our ancestors, the stories we share weave us together, connecting us to everyone who has come before us. May we keep these stories alive! Teach us to notice your love in the world and tell others about it. Amen.


